Almost a half-century ago, Ioanna Burtzos was looking for someplace to volunteer her services at the newly created Holy Apostles parish. "My voice wasn't a singing voice so I couldn't be in the choir," Ioanna recalled. "But I was a teacher and worked with children all my life. So I figured I could do something with students."

The choir's loss became a monumental gain for the Sunday School. Shortly after volunteering to teach, Ioanna became director of Holy Apostles' Sunday School program, a position she held for 47 years before retiring this summer. "I've been blessed with teachers who were very faithful, very cooperative, very willing, very loving," Ioanna said. "It was a pleasure being there on Sundays."

Back in the early days, she directed a program that was in the basement of the church's original location in Broadview, and a tiny

house behind it. In the winter, she'd have to negotiate the sometimes icy walkway between the two structures.


Over the years, she has directed a program in which thousands of children have learned the fundamental beliefs of the Greek Orthodox faith. Two of those children, her

daughters, Amelia Lozano and Eleni Fosses, are Sunday School teachers at the parish today. Her son, Foti, was an altar boy.

At the same time that she was directing the Sunday school, Ioanna was a 7th grade social studies teacher in Downers Grove, a job she

From Father Bill... *How to live one day at a time*



Some years ago a book was published under the title, *How to live 365 Days a Year*.

Perhaps the most important bit of practical spiritual advice that can be given to people

in the world today is contained in the title *How to Live One Day at a Time*.

Live one day at a time. This does not mean that thoughts of the future should never be

permitted to enter a person's mind at all.

At times, every intelligent human being is bound to think seriously of death and heaven and hell: all future realities that should affect him in important ways. Yet, to earn a happy death, win heaven, and escape hell, no one needs to worry today about the problems, temptations and responsibilities of next week, next month, or next year. It is only necessary to give God each day, even each hour, as it comes along.

It is only natural for human beings to have

thoughts about their material and temporal future here in this world. It is an impossibility to live without hopes, dreams, and plans. The sick man looks forward to being well. The student looks forward to his graduation and to using the education he is acquiring. Engaged couples look forward to their marriage. The poor man looks forward to release from his debts and privations.

The motto of the man who lives one day at a time is suggested by God himself in the

Our Heavenly Ladder

School and hectic work schedules will be starting in just a few short weeks. It is hard to believe that summer passed by so fast. August, however, is an exciting month. During the first 14 days of the month, we will prepare for the Kimisis or 'Falling Asleep' of the Theotokos celebrated on August 15. At this time, we will pray the Paraklesis to Mary, the Mother of God. Some of us may not be familiar with the Paraklesis, which is a beautiful service of supplication to the Theotokos or 'bearer of God'. Although it is typically prayed in church, the Paraklesis can be sung in people's homes. We seek the Lord's help by asking the Theotokos to intercede and pray to her Son for us.

As the priest censes the icons and the people, the chanters sing, "Higher above the heavens above are you (the Theotokos)." As we enter the church, we see behind the Holy Altar, very prominently displayed, the Platytera, an icon of the Theotokos holding Jesus, surrounded by a heavenly blue color. Some of our non-Orthodox friends have visited the church and asked, "If you Orthodox Christians believe in Christ, why does this icon of Mary have such a prominent position in the church?" Maybe you have the same question. The Platytera or "More Spacious than the Heavens" expresses our Faith's core beliefs. Mary is essential because of her relationship with Christ. If you carefully review icons depicting the Theotokos, she is never by herself. She is always with Christ. Yet, Christ could never have been born without her consent. Mary is significant because of the One she bore. She provides the throne for Christ.

Try putting yourself in Mary's shoes. Would you have said "yes" to bearing the Son of God out of wedlock? The Theotokos is a model and example for all of us. Do you remember the Annunciation when the Archangel explained to Mary that she would bear a Son? He said, "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Highest will overshadow you; therefore, also, that Holy One who is to be born will be called the Son of God." May had a decision to make. Was she willing to bear the Son of God? Was she willing to disregard the potential trouble she could get in for being an unwed mother? Listen to her answer and the secret to a life of spiritual service: "Behold the maidservant of

Parish Council meeting of Wednesday, June 27

Parish Council members present included: Fr.

Bill, Fr. Nicholas, George Alex, Chrisy Banakis, George Chechopoulos, Terry Chiganos, Jim Fotopoulos, Jim Kapolas, Nick Kirkeles, George T. Mannos, Jr., Steve Melonides, Peter Poteres, Steve Savas, and Peter Tomaras.

Financial Report

- ✦ George Mannos reported that for the month of May, the church had a positive cash flow of \$174,255.43. For the five months ending May 31, the church had a positive cash flow of \$195,533.43. Steve Savas moved to approve the financial statement. The motion passed unanimously.
- ✦ George Mannos reported the results of the last committee meeting. The committee proposed a budget of \$170,000.00 for the multi-purpose room renovation. A cost-benefit analysis was completed on how to fund this project. It was recommended that the money be taken from the general account. A motion by Steve Savas in favor of the recommendation passed unanimously.

Stewardship

- ✦ Steve Melonides reported that as of May 31, the church has received 704 pledges (down 30 from 2006) totaling \$588,235.02 (up \$15,360.16 from 2006) for an average pledge of \$835.57 (up \$55.08 from 2006). Amount paid YTD was \$426,185.52 (up \$20,219.01 from 2006). An additional \$598.00 was collected for 2006, leaving a balance of \$11,940.

Correspondence

- ✦ Peter Poteres reported that the parish received thank you notes from: Presvytera Effie for the flowers; Ioanna Burtzos for the gifts; and from the Metropolitan Soterios of Korea for our donation to his missionary church.
- ✦ A note was received from the Orthodox Christian Education Commission announcing the celebration of its 50th anniversary with a donation request for their ad book. Jim Fotopoulos moved that a \$500 ad be purchased. The motion passed unanimously.
- ✦ The Choir Federation has requested a donation for its 50th anniversary ad book. George Alex moved that we purchase a gold page ad. The motion passed unanimously.

Meditation

- ✦ The tonsuring of our senior altar boys will take place following Friday's vesper service on the occasion of the feast day of Holy Apostles.
- ✦ Father Bill remarked that as we celebrate the 4th of July, we should think about another noteworthy event: the signing of a false union between the Roman Catholic Church and the Orthodox Church on July 5, 1439. The union was deemed false because of one man, St. Mark of Ephesus. He refused to sign the document and denounced the union. St. Mark sought a genuine unity based on faith and liturgical practice. Refusing to capitulate, he denounced the act as a ploy to sell Orthodoxy for the benefit of the government.

Miscellaneous

- ✦ Nick Kirkeles said that the Fanari campers put a package together containing hard candy and a quilt to send to Nick Anos who is serving in Iraq. He also requested that Parish Council members donate packages of Crystal Light because the water in Iraq is substandard.
- ✦ Our total Archdiocesan commitment for 2007 is \$95,854. The council had budgeted \$110,000. Jim Kapolas moved that we keep the assessment at the rate that the archdiocese assessed and save the balance for future archdiocese needs. The motion passed unanimously.
- ✦ Nick Kirkeles met with Steve Mannos of Horton Insurance regarding the general liability insurance. Two companies were proposed and discussed. George Alex moved that the plan from Great Central be accepted. The motion passed unanimously.
- ✦ The design specifications for the multi-purpose room renovation project are complete. The project will be open for bids from the community.

Building & Grounds

- ✦ The power surge on June 17 affected the alarm panel which needs to be repaired.

Old Business

- ✦ Peter Poteres reported that McCloud Extermination Company of Schaumburg has been engaged to service the church.
- ✦ Jim Fotopoulos reported that he has consulted with Add On Glass Company for a bid to upgrade the windows.

To lessen worry, live in the here and now

Bible; "So do not worry about tomorrow: tomorrow will take care of itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own." In the Sermon on the Mount, God says: "Why are you fearful, O you of little faith?" and the succeeding words that rebuke all who worry inordinately about food, drink, and clothing and status for tomorrow. Matthew 6:25-34.

It is good, then, for everyone who finds himself subject to anxiety and worry to ask himself frequently: "How much of my worry springs solely from concern about future possible events? How much of it can I eliminate completely by concentrating simply on using this day rightly and well?"

Each day that God gives to any one of us is only the latest in a long series of good things. He has given to us in the past. It should be looked upon not as the threshold to a doubtful and uncertain and worrisome future, but as one more which might be the last gift on top of thousands of past benefactions.

One of the greatest gifts given is the ability to smile. Smiles breed smiles. A positive attitude is as contagious as the flu. Unfortunately, so are frowns, sighs, and harsh words. Whatever you deposit in the bank of life, you withdraw in return, sometimes with interest.
