"All her glory is from within"

"Listen, O daughter, behold and incline your ear, and forget your people and your father's house; for the King desired your beauty." ~ Psalm 44:11-12

These words of the Prophet David were spoken regarding a specific person, and that person is the Theotokos and Ever-Virgin Mary. What David saw in the Spirit was a three-year-old child leaving her parents' house, only to enter God's house, because the King of All saw her virginal beauty and desired her to become His living temple. This is the event the Church celebrates on November 21 every year: The Entrance of the Theotokos into the Temple of the Lord.

Mary's beauty is merely glimpsed at by the Prophet, as he continues his song to the Virgin with these words: "All her glory is from within, adorned and embroidered with golden tassels" (Psalm 44:14).

Note that **the beauty and splendor which David sees is "from within," the inner radiance of a pure and humble soul**, whiter than snow, glowing brighter than the sun and aflame with love for her Lord.

So she runs, no, joyfully skips into the temple, into the Holy of Holies, into her heav-



Welcoming the Non-Orthodox

The adult inquirer has begun the journey to Orthodox Christianity long before entering the doors of our parish.

It may begin with a sense of emptiness or a feeling that there exists something more than they are finding in their current faith tradition.

Inquirers may come to the Orthodox Church from a faith tradition that has disappointed them in some way. **More** and more, inquirers are coming to the Orthodox Church through intermarriage.

Though our responsibility as a Church is first of all to support marriages, whether spouses are of one faith tradition or two, we are always glad to welcome the non-Orthodox Christian spouse that chooses to become Orthodox.

As the visible presence of the One Holy Catholic and Apostolic Church, each parish is called to witness to those within and those outside the community of believers.

If we believe that in Orthodoxy we have the fullness of the Truth, then we have the great responsibility to share it with all people. Bringing people to Christ and strengthening their faith is a person-to-person process.

In the early days of the Church, people became Christians not because of what they read in the Bible – there was no Bible to read. **People became Christians because of what they experienced in the Christian community.**

People will come through the doors of our parish for a variety of reasons. Their first impression is critical to their decision to come back. Will we be ready for them? We need to ask ourselves, if ours was the only Orthodox Church a person ever visited, or if I were the only Orthodox Christian that

enly Father's house, to remain with Him in steadfast prayer and worship. And she would have gladly remained there the rest of her days, in prayerful silence and communion with her Lord, had she not a greater task to fulfill in bringing forth the Son of God in the flesh for the salvation of the world.

There in the temple of the law young Mary lived as though in Paradise. As St. Gregory Palamas said, "She lived for God alone and was sustained and preserved only by Him who was to pitch His tent among us through her. She saw only God, making God her delight and continually waiting on Him."

Thus the pure one became even purer, living in holy stillness, desiring to be one with God, as much as God the King desired her inner beauty.

In the temple, she was being prepared to become the living temple of the Word of God. Rather, she was preparing herself in holy quiet and divine contemplation to become the receptacle of Divinity. In this way, dear brothers and sisters, **our sweet Panagia is an example of holy silence and of the fruit borne by such stillness and waiting on God.** Of course, her role was absolutely unique, in that she alone brought forth in the flesh Christ, the Son of God.

But if we look to the manner of her life, we will see how we too can bring forth Christ within us, how He can come to dwell in our hearts, and how we can come to feel and experience the divine movements of the Holy Spirit within.

To quote St. Gregory Palamas once more, "Thus those whose hearts have been purified by holy stillness see God within themselves as in a mirror. The immediate proof of this is the Virgin, who, having kept company with quietness from the earliest age, brings the greatest benefits to us, and commends to God those in need as no one else can.

She alone lived in holy quiet from such early childhood in a manner surpassing nature, and she alone of the human race bore the Word, who is the God-man, without knowing man."

By the intercessions of the Theotokos, Savior save us.

a person ever met, would that person want to become Orthodox?

Because the Orthodox Christian worship experience is so unique – it fills the five senses – it may seem foreign to the inquirer. Reaching out to those who enter our doors with a sincere handshake, greeting and a welcoming smile could be the most important missionary work we do.

Friendliness can have eternal implications. Remember that Zacchaeus was converted merely by Christ's acceptance of him.

In reaching out to inquirers, it is helpful to find those aspects of faith that we share. One Jewish inquirer meeting with the priest to find if she would be able to reconcile her faith with that of her Greek Orthodox fiancé was visibly moved when the priest turned to his bookshelf and took down a copy of the Tanakh (Sacred Writings of Judaism).

She gradually came to accept that these sacred writings, which make up what we call the Old Testament, are the foundation upon which Christianity rests. Over a year later she was baptized into the Greek Orthodox Church.

In all discussions, we must show respect for the individual inquirers and their faith, culture and tradition. Though they may choose to become Orthodox Christians, their faith, culture and tradition are an integral part of who they are. They will also have family and friends who remain faithful to their previous traditions.

We bring others to Orthodoxy, not by criticizing their faith tradition, but by respecting that which is good in it, and pointing out those aspects of faith that we share.

A good priest once asked "Doesn't renewal have to come first before we can evangelize others? Don't we have to be infected with Christ before we can be contagious?" This is why education is the key to bringing others to Orthodoxy – education of faithful Orthodox and education of the inquirer.

> Education leads to a more personal participation in worship, a more personal faith and ongoing development toward theosis. Many of the actions we take to reach out to inactive Orthodox Christians and inquirers are also effective in revitalizing the faith of our active Orthodox.

> Forty days after His Resurrection, at the time of His Ascension, Jesus gathered His disciples with Him and promised that they would soon receive the Holy Spirit. He called upon them to be His witnesses. This same calling is directed to each one

of us. The front lines of Jesus' army today are faithful men and women who live ordinary lives in the world, attending school, making a living, raising families, participating in the daily life of our society.

In Acts 2 we read, "The Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved." If we do the work of ministry, reflecting the light and the love of Christ, others will come.

As He called upon His disciples on the day of His Ascension, He has also called upon each one of us to be His witnesses "...in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth."

PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE AUGUST 24 PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

PC SECRETARY: STEVE MILAK EDITED BY: VAL DRANIAS

The meeting was called to order at 7:32 pm by Norm Pomrening. Attendance: Absent-Jim Maragos; Guests-Joan Berg, Jim Sotirakos, Greg Arzoumanidis (members of the Foundation Committee-present only for Foundation Update). Father George gave the opening prayer and Norm read the Mission Statement.

Old Business: Proposed HA Foundation Update: Joan Berg. Patty Pappas presented a brief history of the proposed HA Foundation. Joan Berg, our pro bono legal advisor to the Foundation Committee, presented drafts of the Articles of Incorporation and the Bylaws of the Foundation. A Q & A session will be held for the Parish Council on October 3, to review and make any additions or corrections to the documents before being presented to the Parish Assembly for approval on 10/22.

N. Kirkeles moved to approve the August, 2023 minutes, L Theotikos seconded. Unanimously approved. Val Dranias presented the correspondence. Thank you from the Brandows for our support of their missionary work in Central America; invitation to the 30th anniversary celebration for Fr. S. Demetriou from Assumption-Homer Glen, Info from St. Iakovos Retreat Center about rental opportunities.

Ecclesiastical Report: Father Dokos – presented a brief resource guide for Orthodox Christians on Orthodox Evangelism: asked the PC to learn from the points presented in the article.

Building & Grounds: Chris Pepke. Annual Roof Inspection-will receive the report in a week. Church Drawings-have been professionally scanned to pdf. They will have a digital home and will be printed to have on file. Shades for MPR-there will be 2 shades per opening (one a blackout and one for daylight). The cost will be approximately \$4000. Painting MPR-looking at installing a commercial wall covering below the chair rail and removing wallpaper on the west wall and then painting. C. Pepke moved to do the work on the west wall and beneath the chair rail at a cost of 25%-30% above the original estimate for the MPR (without these additions). B. Leider seconded. Passed – 2 opposed. Landscaping-in the design process again. New designer and bids. Will have the design for next PC meeting. The hope is to have it done by Pascha. Design Group – an Aesthetics or Design Group is being formed to help with decisions concerning the physical esthetics of the Church. There are about 100 projects to be completed of those 60 are maintenance and 30-40 are capital projects.

Finance: Steve Milak: The Operating account cash balance has increased by \$83,659, year-to-date. As of 8/31, the total Operating account cash balance, including monies parked to earn higher rates of interest is \$775,152. The Capital account cash balance has increased by \$54,513 year-to-date. This positive flow is due to a \$60,000 transfer of Dinner Dance surplus revenues from the Operating to Capital account in August. As of 8/31, the total Capital account cash balance, including monies parked to earn higher rates of interest is \$417,080. The church's total operating and capital cash balance as of 8/31 is \$1,192,232. Although our YTD Net Revenue is \$83,663, our goal of finishing the year ahead of budget will be challenging, as our monthly expenses will easily outpace our revenues from now until the end of the year. In general, the books were clean for August. Having to catch up on Fr. Nicholas' health insurance payment. Cloud storage of all budget reports in church's Google Workspace.

Technology: Steve Milak. Purchased and setup a new laptop for Fr. Nicholas. Outsource Solution Group is using a new backup provider, Veeam; verified backed up data will remain in the U.S. *WiFi*: Equipment has arrived; need to set aside time for installation. *MP Room A/V*: Started requirements gathering of the church's need, which will be used to fit to an appropriate solution with contractors. *HARC Point of Sale System*: S. Milak moved to spend up to \$2000 and \$50 a month service fee on a new point of sale system for HARC. L. Theotikos seconded. Unanimously approved.

Stewardship & Welcoming: Sandy Pihos. *Stewardship Data in comparison to 2022:* The 612 YTD pledges are 3% less than the 633 we had received by the end of August 2022. We have achieved 82% of our Stewardship Goal of 750 pledges. \$752K pledged is more than the \$625K we had received by the end of August 2022. We have achieved 66% of our goal to fund our entire operating budget through pledges. \$656K collected is 4% more than the \$633K received by the end of August 2022. Median pledge is \$600 which is equal to the August 2022 median pledge. Average pledge of \$1,229 is 7% more than the \$1,146 YTD August 2022 average pledge. *Tailgate Report:* Approximately 120 people attended. They were an enthusiastic crowd. Lots of good food. Special thank you to Eleni Chechopoulos for baking and donating the fantastic dessert table. Overall gross income was \$6,035. After expenses and prize payouts, profit is estimated to be below \$3,000. Thank you to Elaine Katzioris, Cindy Clark and Nick Kirkeles for planning and chairing the event. **Welcoming:** Ministry Fair went well –

looking to some improvements for next year. Emily Rehn is looking for young adults who would be willing to be introduced to young adults who are visiting our church. Considering a bingo night after January 1. Need ideas for 5th Saturday Serve Days.

Ushering: George Chechopoulos: Usher Interns from SS have started. They will be with us every other Sunday. George will remind us in his weekly email.

Greek School: Lena Theotikos: Tuition will amount to \$88,000. \$10,000 more than expected. Teachers will undergo the Youth Protection training of the Archdiocese. Parents and students will be required to sign a code of conduct. Patty Pappas is creating the document. First grade has 21 students so the class will be split, and Zoe will take the second class, L. Theotikos moved that we pay Zoe for the year as a teacher in addition to her Principal's salary. B. Leider seconded. Unanimously approved.

Missions: Peter Bell. Thank you from the Brandows.

Old Business:

Employee Handbook Revision: Emilia Linardakis and Sandy Pihos. Changes will be made and the Handbook is to be approved at the next PC meeting.

Mosaic Update: Val Dranias. First issue out. Mailing was delayed because we didn't have enough for bulk mailing and had to be sent first class that we needed to pay for upfront. We have enough (200) for bulk mailing from now on.

Bronze Welcome Sign: Sandy Pihos. The sign will be 44 X 20 at a cost of \$4,418. N. Kirkeles moved that we purchase the sign at a cost not to exceed \$4500. V. Dranias seconded. Unanimously approved.

Website Update: Father Georgiou. Checked with Nicole Dahdal, a professional website developer, on any changes needed to the new website. Some were made and Nicole signed off on it. Once we have the new pictures, it's good to go.

New Business:

Formation of Interior Design Ministry: Norm Pomrening. Message will be sent to the congregation for volunteers.

Parish Council Nominations: Norm Pomrening. T. Chiganos nominated both candidates, Andrew Kraulus and Jim Clohessy. Secret ballot took place. Andrew Kraulus is our new PC member.

Confidentially Policy: Sandy Pihos. PC was reminded that discussions should not be taken outside of the meeting especially concerning individuals. Careful what we say about people. There is a lack of trust that PC members will keep things confidential.

Zoom Account for HA: Emilia Linardikis. E. Linardakis moved to purchase a Zoom account for the Parish Council. Sandy Pihos seconded. Unanimously approved.

Request for use of the MPR. Spero Demakis asked for approval that the AHEPA District Convention be held at HA in our MPR. No action was taken.

Youth Basketball – N. Kirkeles moved that \$2000 be added to the basketball budget because of an additional team, practice gym rental and uniforms. L. Theotikos seconded. Unanimously approved.

Special Meetings – 10/3 for Foundation documents and TBD for Budget Approval.

During the Nativity Fast or Advent, which is the **40 days from November 15 until Christmas**, the Church encourages us to intensify our spiritual lives in order to ready our souls and bodies for the Feast of Christ's First Coming.

We do this through fasting, prayer, almsgiving, Holy Confession and increased attention given to "preparing for His coming", to make sure we've done what we can to make a "fit dwelling place for Him" in our hearts and lives.

During this sacred period of preparation, the **Divine Liturgy is offered every day.** Please take advantage of the increased amount of services to sanctify your souls and to also make sure to go to Holy Confession. Your priests are always available to hear confessions, which is not an optional Sacrament, but necessary, for through Confession we receive God's mercy and forgiving grace.

LENTEN RECIPES TO TRY FOR THE NATIVITY FAST

BRAISED OKRA

11/2 lbs. fresh okra (or 10 0z. frozen)1 can diced tomatoes1 large onion, chopped

2 garlic cloves, minced 1⁄2 cup vegetable oil 1⁄2 tsp. sugar ½ cup vinegar1 tablespoon chopped fresh parsley salt and pepper to taste

Wash okra and trim stalks but do not remove the cone-shaped tops. Place in a bowl, pour the vinegar over and let sit for 30 minutes (this prevents the okra from coming apart while cooking). Drain, rinse well and dry on a paper towel. Heat oil in a pan. Add onions and garlic and sauté for a few minutes. Add okra and cook until lightly browned. Add remaining ingredients, season to taste with salt and pepper. Cover and simmer for 30-40 minutes until tender.

NOTE: Green beans or zucchini can be substituted for the okra.

PEANUT BUTTER BARS

1 cup light corn syrup1 1/2 cups creamy peanut butter½ cup granulated sugar2 teaspoons vanilla½ cup light brown sugar4 cups Rice Krispies

Mix corn syrup, white and brown sugars in a pot and bring to a boil. Remove from heat and mix in the peanut butter and vanilla. Add cereal and mix. Transfer to a 9 X 13 pan and press down. Cut in squares.

FASOLADA (WHITE BEAN) GREEK SOUP

1 lb. white beans	1 cup canned or fresh tomatoes	1/2 cup tops, chopped celery
2 finely chopped onion	2 tablespoons chopped, fresh parsley	3 small, diced carrots
1 1/2 teaspoon salt	1/4 teaspoon pepper, or to taste	

3 tablespoons fresh chopped herbs, such as parsley or chives

1/2 cup olive oil (for strict fast, use vegetable oil)

Wash the beans well and let them soak in a medium bowl filled with water.

In the morning drain off the water and put in a saucepan with 8 cups of cold water.

Bring to a boil on medium-high heat, reduce heat and allow to simmer for 1 hour on low heat.

Add remaining ingredients and cook gently for about an hour or until the beans and vegetables are tender. Garnish with fresh chopped herbs, if desired.
