November is stewardship month and you may be asking yourself: "How much should I give to Holy Apostles?"

Everything we have comes from the Lord's hands – we are stewards or managers of these gifts. The "Christian owns nothing because God owns everything" St. John Chrysostom wrote.

We offer our time, talents and treasure back to the Lord in thanksgiving for all that He has given us.

"What do you have that you did not receive? And if you did receive it, why do you boast as though you did not" (1 Corinthians 4:7) St. Paul asks.

The rich young ruler asks: "Good Teacher, what good thing shall I do that I may have eternal life?"

Jesus said to him, "If you want to be perfect, go, sell what you have and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; and come, follow Me" (*Matthew* 19:16,21).

How Do We Help Our Children Know God? By Toni Milak

We want our children to grow into adults who continue to love God, come to church, and live out their Orthodox Christian faith.

But how do we best accomplish this?

This is the question our Effective Christian Ministry (ECM) team of Fr. George, Youth Director Alexa Kakis, Sunday School Director Toni Milak, and GOYA advisor Lia Chiganos are grappling with this year in a cohort program alongside other churches around the country as national statistics show young adults are leaving the church in droves.

Before we can map our course forward, we need to know our desti-



nation. We want our children – really, all of our parishioners – to have FAITH. But what exactly do we mean by this?

It is tempting to say something like "Know all about God" or more specifically "Know the truth about God, the Theotokos, the saints, etc." But does knowing about God mean we have faith? Even the devil knew the truth about God, and correctly identified Christ as God in the Gospels. But he isn't faithful!

Instead, faith might be better described as knowing God, being in relationship with Him, seeking to be deeper in relationship with Him by talking to Him, listening for Him, and doing things that express our love for Him.

What expresses our love for Him? Perhaps we can boil it down to two things: worship and loving our neighbor. But how do we help our children to KNOW God?

There's a story from the Old Testament that Steve Christophorou shares in the ECM course that was helpful to me in understanding something perhaps a little surprising about God and how He interacts with us, which is certainly something that we want for our children (and ourselves!) to experience.

It is the story of Elijah, which you can read about in the Book of 3 Kingdoms [1 Kings]. Despite the incredible miracles he had prayed for and received (including *(continued, pq. 3)*

God's Kingdom is to be done with the resources that God has entrusted to us. While there are saints who gave everything away, we define stewardship as giving proportionately.

We tithe, or give a percentage of our income. "Will a man rob God? Yet you have robbed Me! But you say, 'In what way have we robbed You?' In tithes and offerings" (*Malachi 3:8*).

"And all the tithe (10%) of the land, whether of the seed of the land or of the fruit of the tree, is the Lord's" (*Leviticus 27:30*).

10% is suggested by the Greek Orthodox Uniform Parish Regulations. We are robbing and stealing from the Lord when we do not tithe.

Your assistance is needed for our aging facilities.

"We have had professionals conduct studies at Holy Apostles. We need \$3.4 million over the next 10 years just to maintain the building. That is \$340,000 per year. If this money does not materialize: The building will continue to accumulate items needing repair faster than they can be addressed" (Fall 2024 General Assembly).

Our beloved church is not a parish "with lots of money" as some claim. More than 80% of our Holy Apostles families are not giving what they are able. A small percentage (20%) are **carrying the load.** We want to continue offering our many excellent ministries (over 34 of them) and reaching out and serving all of our Holy Apostles families.

Our beautiful, 65-year-old church community is here through the generosity of the people who sacrificially gave their treasure, time and talents to build this community. **Many of you are here and being served because people in the earlier generations made the investment. We can do the same!**

We are grateful to those who are carrying the weight and heeding God's call through faithful tithing and proportional giving with generous hearts. Thank you.

For those whose lives are receiving but not obeying God's plan of proportional giving, please prayerfully consider your stewardship pledge this year and commit to percentage giving.

When I was a little boy, my Mom paid me a \$10 weekly allowance. The first 10% (\$1) went in the church collection plate on Sunday. Last year's median income in Westchester was around \$100,000. A mere 2% would be \$2,000 a year to start. As we progress, we can increase that proportion. Our giving is central to our faith. As the 1917 Army recruiting Uncle Sam poster reads, "We need you".

fire being called down from heaven!) Elijah was overcome with despair and doubt that God would prevail over the demons and idolaters.

God calls Elijah up to a mountain and intends to offer an encounter with Elijah. First there is a great wind, so strong that it splits the mountain – but scripture says God was not in the wind.

Then there is a powerful earthquake that shakes the mountain – but scripture says God was not in the earthquake. A great fire then consumes the mountain – but again, scripture says God was not in the fire.

Finally, in the quiet, after all of these incredible events, Elijah hears a still small voice, and immediately knows it to be God, covering his face.

God doesn't reveal Himself to Elijah in powerful displays of His might; rather, **He speaks into the quiet stillness of Elijah's** heart.

Maybe you remember the famous verse from the Psalms "Be still, and know that I am God!" (Ps 46:10)

So if the scripture is telling us that we need stillness to hear God, to know Him, then as 21st century Americans, we may be in trouble!

How much quiet and stillness are our children experiencing? With all the noise of the internet, hand-held devices, airpods, etc, is there any space for God to speak quietly into our hearts? For us to feel and know He is with us? We want to offer our children – and ourselves – literal and figurative space for stillness and quiet. Here are a few ideas. You may have more!

- 1. Walk in nature. A quiet hike (without earbuds!) in the beauty of God's creation gives an opportunity for awe and wonder, as well as the inner stillness God needs to speak into your heart.
- 2. Pause before prayer. Sometimes we rush into the Lord's Prayer before a meal or bedtime – practicing a moment of silence first can create a sense of peace, stillness, and focus.
- 3. Create a special place for stillness. Having a spot in your home with some icons and maybe a vigil light where anyone can go to spend a little time in quiet and prayer can give family members a place to turn when seeking God.
- 4. Set boundaries around smartphones/iPads. Simple limits (for example: no phones at meals, or all devices plugged in and off after 7 pm) can allow for that inner quiet that God needs to work in one's heart.

These first little steps can open our hearts to God, giving us the chance to know Him, which will make faithful living (engaging in worship and loving our neighbor) a true, internal desire.

Our team prays this little article helps your family take some concrete steps toward improving the development of your faith in God. And we ask you to please keep us in your prayers as we learn and seek ways to improve the ministries in our parish for the benefit of everyone.

But don't despair! You can make space for God!

Feast of the Holy Great Martyr and Most Wise Katherine of Alexandria

The Holy Great Martyr Katherine was the daughter of Konstos, the governor of Alexandria, Egypt during the reign of Emperor Maximian (305-313). Living in the capital, the center of Hellenistic knowledge, and possessed of a rare beauty and intellect, Katherine received an excellent education, studying the works

of the greatest philosophers and teachers of antiquity. Young men from the most worthy families of the empire sought her hand, but she was not interested in any of them. She told her parents that she would enter into marriage only with someone who surpassed her in nobility, wealth, comeliness and wisdom.

Katherine's mother, a secret Christian, sent her to her own Spiritual Father, a saintly Elder living in a cave outside the city, for advice. After listening to Katherine, the Elder said that he knew of someone who surpassed her in everything. "His countenance is more radiant than the shining of the sun, and all of creation is governed by His wisdom. His riches are given to all the nations of the world, yet they never diminish. His compassion is unequaled."

This description of the Heavenly Bridegroom produced an ardent desire in the soul of the holy maiden to see Him. "If you do as I tell you," said the monk, "you will gaze

upon the countenance of this illustrious man." In parting, the Elder gave Katherine an icon of the Theotokos with the Divine Child on Her arm and told her to pray with faith to the Mother of the Heavenly Bridegroom, and she would hear Katherine and grant her heart's desire.

Katherine prayed all night and was permitted to see the Most Holy Virgin, Who said to her Divine Son, "Behold Thy handmaiden Katherine, how fair and virtuous she is." But the Child turned His face away from her saying, "No, she is ugly and unbelieving. She is a foolish pauper, and I cannot bear to look at her until she forsakes her impiety."

Katherine returned again to the Elder deeply saddened, and told him what she had seen in the dream. He received her, instructed her in the faith of Christ, admonished her to preserve her purity and integrity and to pray unceasingly. She then received the Mystery of Holy Baptism from him. Again Saint Katherine had a vision of the Most Holy Theotokos with her Child. Now the Lord looked at her tenderly and gave her a beautiful ring, a wondrous token of her betrothal to the Heavenly Bridegroom (this ring is still on her hand).

At that time Emperor Maximian was in Alexandria for a pagan festival. Therefore, the celebration was especially splendid and crowded. The cries of the sacrificial animals, the smoke and the smell of the sacrifices, the endless blaze of fires, and the bustling crowds at the arenas defiled the city of Alexandria. Human



victims also were brought, the confessors of Christ, who would not deny Him under torture. They were condemned to death in the fire. Katherine's love for the Christian martyrs, and her fervent desire to ease their sufferings, compelled her to speak to the pagan priest and to Emperor Maximian.

> Introducing herself, Katherine confessed her faith in the One True God, and exposed the errors of the pagans. The beauty of the maiden captivated the Emperor. In order to convince her of the superiority of pagan wisdom, the Emperor ordered fifty of the most learned philosophers and rhetoricians to dispute with her, but the Saint got the better of the wise men, so that they came to believe in Christ themselves. Saint Katherine made the Sign of the Cross over the martyrs, and they bravely accepted death for Christ and were burned alive by order of the Emperor.

> Unable to persuade the Saint, Maximian tried to entice her with the promise of riches and fame. Hearing her angry refusal, the Emperor ordered her to terrible tortures and imprison her. The Empress Augusta, who had heard much about the Saint, wanted to see her. She asked the military commander Porphyrios to ac-

company her to the prison with a detachment of soldiers. The Empress was impressed by Katherine's strong spirit, and her face was radiant with divine grace. The holy martyr explained the Christian Faith to them, and they were all converted to Christ.

On the following day, they again brought Katherine to court where, under the threat of being broken on the wheel, she was urged to renounce the Christian Faith. The Saint steadfastly confessed Christ and she was taken to be tortured on four wheels with sharp iron spikes, but an Angel smashed the instruments of execution.

After seeing this miracle, the Empress Augusta, Porphyrios and 200 soldiers confessed their faith in Christ, and were subsequently beheaded. Maximian tried again to entice the holy martyr, offering to marry her, and she again refused. Saint Katherine remained faithful to her heavenly Bridegroom Christ, and after praying to Him, she laid her head on the block beneath the executioner's sword on November 25.

The relics of Saint Katherine were taken by the Angels to Mount Sinai. In the sixth century, the head and left hand of the holy martyr were found and transferred with honor to the newly-constructed church of the Monastery on Mount Sinai.

Saint Katherine is called upon for relief and assistance during a difficult childbirth. Pilgrims to her monastery on Mount Sinai are given souvenir rings as a remembrance of their visit. Rev. Dr. Stanley S. Harakas

Just as there are times for feasting, there are also times set aside for fasting. During these periods, certain foods are prohibited. These are, in order of frequency of prohibition, meat (including poultry), dairy products, fish, olive oil and wine. Fruits, vegetables, grains and shellfish are permitted throughout the year.

Of course, the Orthodox Church never reduces the practice of fasting to a legalistic observance of dietary rules. Fasting, that is not accompanied by intensified prayer and acts of charity, inevitably becomes a source of pride.

The Church also recognizes that not everyone can fast to the same degree, and assumes that individual Christians will observe the fast prescribed for them by their Spiritual Fathers.

The following are fasting days and seasons:

- 1. All Wednesdays and Fridays, except for those noted below;
- 2. Day before Feast of Theophany (Jan. 5);
- 3. Cheesefare Week (the last week before the Great Lent, during which meat and fish are prohibited, but dairy products are permitted even on Wednesday and Friday);
- 4. Great Lent (from Clean Monday through the Friday before Lazarus Saturday, olive oil and wine are permitted on weekends);
- 5. Great and Holy Week (note that Great and Holy Saturday is a day of strict fasting, during which faithful abstain from olive oil and wine),
- 6. Holy Apostles' Fast (from the Monday after All Saints' Day through June 28, inclusive);
- 7. Fast for the Dormition of the Mother of God (August 1-14, excluding August 6, on which fish, wine and olive oil are permitted);
- 8. Beheading of St. John the Baptist (Aug. 29),
- 9. Exaltation of the Holy Cross (September 14);
- 10, Nativity Lent (November 15-December 24, although fish, wine and olive oil are permitted, except on Wednesdays and Fridays, until December 17).

The following are fasting days on which fish, wine and olive oil are permitted:

- 1. The Feast of the Annunciation (March 25, unless it falls outside the Great Lent, in which case all foods are permitted);
- 2. Palm Sunday;
- 3. The Feast of the Transfiguration (August 6);
- 4. The Feast of the Entry into the Temple of the Mother of God (November 21).

On the following days, all foods are permitted:

- 1. The first week of the Triodion from the Sunday of the Publican and the Pharisee through the Sunday of the Prodigal Son, including Wednesday and Friday;
- 2. Diakainisimos (or Bright) Week, following the Sunday of Pascha,
- 3. The week following Pentecost; and
- 4. From the Feast of the Nativity of the Lord (December 25) through January 4.

The Mosaic will publish information from the Pastoral Guidelines each month.

It is the Orthodox Tradition to fast from food products that contain blood. So, we fast from meat, fish, dairy products, oil, and wine. (Oil and wine, up until the last couple of centuries, were stored in skins of animals. This is why we can eat grapes and olives, but cannot have wine or olive oil.)

We can eat shellfish because they do not contain blood.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE SEPTEMBER 19 PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

Norm Pomrening called the meeting to order at 7:33 pm. Father Dokos led us in the opening prayer. Norm Pomrening recited the Mission Statement. Val Dranias moved to approve the minutes of the last PC meeting; Sandy Pihos seconded the motion. Unanimously approved. Correspondence: Val Dranias read a thank you from the family of Mary Aravosis; a request from the National Forum of Greek Orthodox Church Musicians for a donation. Consensus was that we had just donated to the Metropolis Choir Conference so we would skip this donation. Ecclesiastical Report: Father Dokos directed a discussion on The Holy and Great Martyr Eustace – St. Efstathios

Effective Christian Ministry Project & Youth: Alexa Kakis was our guest speaker to introduce the PC to ECM. Last year 15-20 parishioners participated in group discussions after viewing 40 videos on what can improve stewardship and participation in our parish. Alexa, Fr. George, Toni Milak and Lea Chiganos are the leadership team for ECM at Holy Apostles. They have 2-3 meetings with their coach, a summit once a month with other churches, and have an end of the month applied project. This month concentrated on Young Adults and what we could do better to keep YA in the church. Suggestions included a moment of silence and better connections with little kids. At the end of 9 months – a big project that gives a plan on how to move forward with keeping Young Adults (18-25) active.

Stewardship & Welcoming: Sandy Pihos

Ministry Fair – The booklet highlighting our various ministries was distributed at the Ministry Fair. We had an excellent attendance and more people seemed to visit the tables and sign up for various ministries. The coffee hour was also hosted by this group. There are now extra booklets available and there was a suggestion that we keep some in the holders behind the pews.

Veterans Day – Stewardship intends to make gift bags for our parish veterans and care packages for our two active military men on Saturday, October 26 after liturgy. There will be an Artoclasia on Sunday, November 10 for all our veterans. We will ask for names to be submitted to the church office, similar to the way we do Graduate Sunday; and call the veterans up to be recognized.

Bingo – A family bingo night will be sponsored by the Stewardship Committee on Saturday, November 9. We will keep the price at \$10 per person. The proceeds will be split between The Midwest Shelter for Homeless Veterans in Wheaton and our next "FUN" fundraiser.

Vesper Potluck – To encourage more people to attend the Saturday Vespers Potlucks, Stewardship plans to send out a flyer with Sunday School students the week before listing the important reasons to attends. They will also create a standalone email to highlight the evening.

A suggestion was made to talk with Building and Grounds, Lou and the Fathers to create a "wish list' of smaller budget items that money from fundraising can go towards within the church.

Honoring Chris Pepke who averages over 20 hours a week working the Building and Grounds needs.

Building & Grounds: Chris Pepke – Electrician was working on some odds and ends and discovered burnt wires and cracked wires. We could have had a fire. Front doors – waiting for pricing on hardware. It will take an additional \$6000 to get it to

look the same. Roof inspection – nothing crazy was found. Carpet in the Choir Loft – will be installed by the end of the year. Tree Work – trees need to be removed. We had a tree fall on one of neighbor's home. We need to do this ASAP. On the east side we need to take out as much brush as possible on Saturday Beautification Day. Suggested that we write a letter to the neighbor who has put lights, a swing and a ladder in our tree. New sump pumps are being installed. 2 TVs have been installed. Brick Project – Cleaning needs to take place after outside work is done. Minimum cost of \$800,000. Does not include tuck pointing. In 1985 we paid \$45,000 (\$200,000 in 2024 money) for just the church – probably will need to add \$400,000 to the \$800,000 for work. Limestone in church – will be cleaned. Lawn Care – Tru Green is \$1700 and we are not happy with their work. Weiss is \$1500. Chris Pepke moved to hire Weiss for our lawn care; Emilia Linardakis seconded. Unanimously approved. Lighting Project – original budget o \$125,000; Designer, then fixtures, then install \$234,000 (all inclusive) for just the church - \$8,000 for offices; \$57,000 for the MPR.

Technology: Steve Milak

Ushering: George Chechopoulos. Sunday School Seating – will be seated in first two rows in aisle between 2 & 3. Concerns were expressed about the signs that had been posted. They will be removed.

Missions: Norm Pomrening - Feed6 scheduled for 1/11/25. We have packed 807,000 meals over the years. We want to get to 1,000,000 meals. We can do it. We have \$18,000 and need another \$15,000 to buy the materials. Discussion followed.

Old Business:


