The Sacred Center of Our Holy Orthodox Faith Is Under Threat

The Ecumenical Patriarchate of Constantinopie (roday's iscanoul) is the sacred center of our Holy Orthodox Faith.

According to ancient canons of the Ecumenical Councils that, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, articulated the principal elements of our Faith, the Ecumenical Patriarch is the first bishop of the Church, charged with responsibility for the whole Church.

Today, the Ecumenical Patriarchate is the see of His All-Holiness Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew, the longest-serving and one of the most consequential Ecumenical Patriarchs in the history of our Church.

However, the Turkish government is presenting the Ecumenical Patriarchate with daily challenges and difficulties that could ultimately destroy its ability to perform its sacred global mission. Amid those challenges and difficulties, the Archons of the Ecumenical Patriarchate are dedicated to protecting and defending our Holy Mother Church of Constantinople.

The Ecumenical Patriarchate is under attack by the Turkish government in five key ways.

- 1. First and foremost, the Ecumenical Patriarchate has no legal identity or rights in Turkey. In the eyes of the Turkish government, the Ecumenical Patriarchate simply does not exist.
- 2. The Turkish government interferes with the election of the Ecumenical Patriarch by requiring that he must be a Turkish citizen, and maintains the right to approve who is selected. This is clearly interference with the Apostolic succession of the Church's leadership.
- 3. We can no longer train our clergy in Turkey because they closed our beloved Halki Seminary in 1971, where we had trained more than 1000 clergymen (including over 300 bishops and even a few Ecumenical Patriarchs) for 127 years. Today, Halki remains closed. As a result, those who want to become clergymen must be sent elsewhere out of the country.

The result is that we are experiencing a gradual asphyxiation of the Holy Mother Church in Turkey. The Greek Orthodox population of Constantinople is now only 2,000 to 2,500 people, down from 300,000 at the beginning of the twentieth century. With all of this said, His All-Holiness Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew has said that there have been recent positive discussions that could possibly lead to the opening of the seminary. We remain cautiously optimistic.

4. The Ecumenical Patriarchate cannot own, inherit or pass along property. The Ecumenical Patriarchate does not even own our churches in Constantinople and its environs. In 1936, the Church owned 8,000 properties, including monasteries, churches, schools, hospitals, orphanages, homes for the aged, homes, and apartment buildings. Today, most have



been confiscated, and we have less than 500 properties remaining.

Occasionally, the Turkish government allows the Ecumenical Patriarchate to regain control of one of these confiscated properties, but only under the most difficult of circumstances. One example is the fact that the Turkish government does not legally recognize the Girls and Boys Orphanage Foundation on the island of Prinkipos (which the Turks refer to as Buyukada), for which the Ecumenical Patriarchate has held a deed since 1902, as belonging to the Ecumenical Patriarchate. In this case, however, the European Court of Human Rights compelled the Turks to hand it over to the Ecumenical Patriarchate, but only in dilapidated condition.

The implications of this are as obvious as they are ominous. Numerous churches have been converted to mosques — most recently Hagia Sophia, which for almost a millennium was the foremost church in the entire Christian world, and the Chora Church in Constantinople. The remaining churches are vulnerable.

5. The Turkish Government does not recognize the "Ecumenical" status of the Patriarch and Patriarchate. Turkish authorities do not allow the use of the term or title "ecumenical" for any religious activity – even though this title has been used since the sixth century and recognized throughout the world. The Turkish government only refers to the Ecumenical Patriarch as the "Fener Patriarch," referring to his headquarters in Constantinople, the Phanar.

Because of the Ecumenical Patriarchate's lack of legal identity, its vulnerability to the decisions of the Turkish state is all-pervasive. If the international human rights organizations such as the European Court of Human Rights and the United

Nations, among others, do not manage to compel the Turkish government to grant property rights to the Ecumenical Patriarchate, the spiritual center of the world's 300 million Orthodox Christians remains essentially defenseless, and perilously close to extinction in its historical homeland.

The Ecumenical Patriarchate needs financial support, so that it is less subject to the will of the Turkish government: the Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew Foundation, which the Archons founded several years ago, is dedicated to providing financial stability for the Ecumenical Patriarchate

Please pray regularly for the Ecumenical Patriarchate and the Christians of Constantinople and prayerfully consider a donation to the Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew Foundation.

The safety and survival of our Ecumenical Patriarchate, the sacred center of our Faith, is a priceless gift that surpasses virtually anything else we could pass on to our children and grandchildren.



Philoptochos "Share the Warmth" month of October coat collection was a great success!! Thank you to Laura Pepke & Debbie Chiganos for organizing this wonderful annual event and thank you to all our parishioners for donating!

All donated coats – 19 went to a local high school and 295 (made 3 trips!!!) went to Repeat Boutique in Wheaton, IL who welcomes people in need, referred from charitable organizations, churches,, and local government agencies. Clients with referrals can shop every three months for a year.

Philoptochos purchased 41 new kids' coats, which were donated to Warm Coats for Cool Kids – a

Philanthropic organization, based in Elmhurst, IL - run by founders Garry & Debbie Vaccaro – that provides winter coats, hats, and gloves to children in need from families in the western suburbs of Chicago.

The coats are distributed through events at local schools and community organizations where kids get to shop and feel pride of ownership in their new winter ensembles.

We also participated in one of these events at the Hillside Elementary School in Hillside, IL where Philoptochos also works with through our Operation Classroom initiative. On this particular day/event, Warm Coats for Cook Kids distributed their 10,000th coat!!!!

PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE OCTOBER 2023 PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

October 16, 2025

PC SECRETARY: PATTY PAPPAS EDITED BY: VAL DRANIAS

The meeting was called to order by President James Maragos at 7:37 PM. Opening prayer offered by Father George Dokos. Nicole Ostendorf recited the Mission Statement. A motion to approve the September 18, 2025 Parish Council Meeting Minutes was made by Bill Leider and seconded by Nicole Voelz. Motion carried unanimously.

Patty Pappas reported on Correspondence. Hellenic College/Holy Cross Greek Orthodox School of Theology - Thank you letter for our \$1,000 donation supporting their Annual Fund Appeal Gifts - Day of Giving; Assumption Greek Orthodox Church of Chicago - Thank you letter for our \$1,000 contribution to their Centennial Fund; Hodges Loizzi - Billings summary from Vanessa Clohessy for pro bono legal services provided in August 2025. Father George Dokos gave the Ecclesiastical Report. He distributed a handout and led a group reading regarding the Holy Apostle lakovos, Brother of the Lord. A brief group discussion followed.

Ministry Reports

Financial - Report by George Antonopoulos

For the first nine months of 2025, we achieved a profit of \$108,000, resulting in an operating account balance of \$915,000. The surplus is primarily attributed to cemetery plot sales (\$40,000), miscellaneous donations (\$40,000) and increased stewardship contributions (\$10,000). The capital account currently holds a balance of \$554,000, with \$421,000 designated for 2025 capital projects. The projected year-end capital balance is estimated at approximately \$100,000.

Stewardship – Steven Milak provided a report on stewardship pledges, attached below.

Formation of a stewardship committee, chaired by Steven Milak. The committee will establish a 12-month execution plan with milestones and engagement goals. Development of talking points and measurable objectives to adjust over time

Building & Grounds – Report by Chris Pepke. Main Office Remodel: Finalizing design and finish selections for review. Lighting Project: 1. Focus areas: nave, baptistry, narthex and exo-narthex. 2. Utilizing energy-efficient, color-adaptive LED lighting. 3. Currently in the design phase; multiple walkthroughs completed. 4. Once finalized, three bids will be solicited. HVAC replacement: 1. The lower level A/C unit (Sunday School and Greek School classrooms) requires full replacement due to EPA refrigerant restrictions. 2. Pricing and replacement options are under review for spring installation.

Technology - Report by Steven Milak

Exploring installation of a new security camera system. Recommendation to conduct a professional security assessment prior to implementation. Briggs Core Dynamics identified as a qualified assessor (estimated cost: \$1,500).

Additional assessment to be sought from Nicole Voelz' brother for comparative recommendations. Motion: Steven Milak moved to allocate up to \$2,000 from the technology grant for a professional security assessment. Seconded by Sandra Pihos. Motion approved unanimously.

Old Business

Metropolis Clergy/Laity Assembly Delegates - Report by James Maragos Parish to elect two delegates for the November 5-6 Metropolis Clergy/Laity Assembly. Sandra Pihos and Steven Savas have expressed interest and will be submitting their names for nomination at the Fall Parish Assembly. Notice sent to all parishioners inviting additional nominees.

Holy Apostles Hellenic Academy - Report by Nicole Ostendorf Current enrollment: 90 students. Recent ice cream social held successfully outdoors. Active PTO with approximately 12 parent volunteers. Grants received: Hellenic Foundation: \$3,382; Greek American Restaurant Association: \$10,000; Ellinomatheia Class: New Wednesday class; preparing students for the May proficiency exam (4 current enrollees); Upcoming events: PTO Bake Sale - November 23 (no coffee hour); Tuition: \$88,250 for 2025-2026; \$50,000 collected to date; Coordinating with church office for Zoom access.

Chapel Hill Cemetery Plots – Report by Patty Pappas 19 additional plots sold since last meeting. Ongoing collaboration with Chapel Hill representative Madison Underwood to finalize transfers and documentation. Chapel Hill is assembling a Holy Apostles binder to organize all plot-related records. Lou and Patty will meet with Chapel Hill once again to reach more clarity on both old and new transactions. Reconciliation of old receipts provided by Chapel Hill is required prior to any future plot sales.

Youth Worker Protection Training – Report by Patty Pappas Updated compliance spreadsheet distributed by Administrative Assistant Andrea San Luis. Several individuals currently non-compliant. Ministry leaders instructed to enforce compliance and update volunteer status lists. Follow-up emails sent emphasizing the need for immediate action.

St. lakovos Retreat Center - Report by James Maragos Four town hall meetings held by the Metropolis of Chicago to discuss the Center's future. Metropolitan Nathanael confirmed no sale will occur for at least five years. Parishes to provide ongoing financial support.

New Business

Parish Assembly Preparation - Report by James Maragos Six Parish Council members met to plan for the Fall Parish Assembly. Steven Milak to prepare slideshow; Lou Kafkes and Alexa Kakis to prepare brochure and communications. Sandra Pihos thanked Council members for supporting the pre-Assembly coffee hour.

Parish Directory - Report by Lou Kafkes Initial plan for volunteer-led directory revised to consider professional services. Universal Church Directories proposal: Free sittings along with an 8 x 10 photo for parishioners.

Optional portrait packages averaging \$170. + No motion required to move forward as no expense is incurred.

2026 Parish Contributions to Archdiocese - a) Archdiocesan Assessment: \$9,541 per month, b) Clergy Pension Plan: \$22,500 per year, c) St. lakovos Retreat Center ('SIRC'): \$9,541 per year, d) Metropolis Cushion Payment: \$8,014 per year, e) Delegates to inquire further about SIRC allocations., f) The 2025 Holy Apostles Budget provides for a \$5,000 payment to SIRC.

Motion: Sandra Pihos moved to donate to the St. lakovos Retreat Center in the amount of \$5,000, with the check to be made out directly to the St. lakovos Retreat Center and mailed to its address in Wisconsin. Seconded by Bill Leider. Motion approved with one nay.

Personnel Matter Discussion to be held in Executive Session following the regular meeting.

2026 Calendar - Report by James Maragos Spring Assembly tentatively scheduled for Sunday, May 3, 2026. Creation of a Calendar Committee to finalize all 2026 events, meetings, and Parish Council committee schedules, for approval at the December Parish Council Meeting.

Capital Campaign - Report by James Maragos Strategy meeting with Dave McGowan (Dave McGowan Consulting) on November 12 (pro bono). Discussion to include stewardship growth, capital projects, and Foundation fundraising strategy. Will evaluate potential professional fundraising support.

Employee Handbook - Report by Sandra Pihos Initiating review and update of the Employee Handbook. Council members invited to submit amendment suggestions. Sandra to coordinate with Vanessa Clohessy on revisions.




